Gather near the entrance to the labyrinth

Gathering Song: "Summer Solstice"

Summer solstice - the longest day of the year Together we gather, there's no place I'd rather be

Than with you on this summer solstice

The longest day of the year.

Welcome

Readings: In my turning and returning, Take me in and let me go.

At the center of the spinning, Root me deep and set me loose. At the still point of the spiral, Draw me close and send me forth. In the passage of the season, Hold me fast and set me free.

In the silence, let us remember the times of meaning, community, creativity, care, healing, tears, and joy that we have shared in this sacred space of this labyrinth. (One minute of silence.) If you would like, you are invited to share ONE word

that expresses what this labyrinth has meant to you.

One: Let us honor our experience as we express our gratitude.

Community: For this labyrinth and the many gifts we have received here, we offer our

thanks to God, the Sisters of St. Joseph, Wisdom Ways, and all those who

have been the labyrinth's caretakers.

One: We are gathered to release this labyrinth back to the earth. I invite as you

are able, standing in the labyrinth place your hands upon it.

Community: (with hands on the ground) We honor this gift with gratitude. We release this space, offering it to all that will be. (release of hands)

One: We are gathered here to bless this space.

Community: We pray for those who will live here, work here, and visit here. May their

needs be graciously met. May this piece of sacred earth be a spiritual and physical support for all. May the beauty of this place continue to make all

things new.

All: May it be so!

Song: "Web of Beauty"

Praise to God, who has spun the threads of being and turns the universe before my eyes. Who has woven this tangled web of beauty that binds me

to the earth and sky. (words and music by Bret Hesla)

Blessing Of What Will Be:

One: As we gather here, we seek to offer up this space to welcome a new

labyrinth.

Community: We ask you, Holy One, to bless this space as a place of your divine work in

the world. Be with all who seek to discern the place of a new labyrinth on

the Carondelet Center grounds.

One: Bless everyone who walks searching for You, for deeper meaning in life,

and for the healing of all creation. May each of us walk in the presence of

the Holy now and always.

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HISTORY

- 1997 Lila Parrish first suggested the labyrinth be created on the grounds of the Sisters of St. Joseph.
- May 1997, Pentecost Sunday, Stu and Mary Bartholomaus created and mowed it for the Wisdom Ways Summer Spirituality Institute, Simple Gifts: The Spirituality of Simplicity.
- Dedication of the Labyrinth September 17, 1998—Feast of Hildegard of Bingen
- Dedication of Wisdom Ways canvas labyrinth, September 17, 2000—Feast of Hildegard of Bingen
- Jean Houston, who introduced Lauren Artress to the labyrinth, visited this labyrinth in 2005.
- Rededication of the Wisdom Ways Labyrinth June 16, 2007
- Lauren Artress opened the mysteries of the labyrinth to thousands of people including programs at Wisdom Ways.
- MJ McGregor faithfully mowed the labyrinth through the years.
- The labyrinth work at Wisdom Ways of Jill K. H. Geoffrion, Barbara Kellet.
 Marilyn Larson, Mary Kaye Medinger, and Lisa Moriarty, has deepened and expanded broadly in this context and internationally.
- Many labyrinth programs at Wisdom Ways through the years including Midwest Labyrinth Festivals
- Thousands of walkers—women, men, and children—have walked this path into the earth during the last 13 years.

The labyrinth, a 77° diameter replica of the labyrinth in Chartres Cathedral in France, remained on the grounds of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Carondelet Center, following the Wisdom Ways 1997 Summer Spirituality Institute. The labyrinth was not part of the original plan of Wisdom Ways. As people learned about it and began walking it as a form of prayer, the labyrinth became a significant image and metaphor for Wisdom Ways mission and vision.
